READINGS ISAIAH 9:1-7 JOHN 1:1-14; 3:16-21; 8:12-20

INTRODUCTION

Imagine yourself in a dark room, maybe during a power outage late at night. You light one candle, and it's amazing the light it gives to your dark world. When the power comes back on, that same candle doesn't seem to shine as brightly any longer. But in fact, the light it gives off hasn't changed. It's just your perception that's changed.

Now imagine a life without Jesus Christ. Hard to imagine, painful even to imagine, but try for just a moment in your mind to enter that darkness. Now, imagine what it would mean to you if Jesus Christ came and dwelt among your darkness with His Light.

What does "Jesus Christ, Light of the world" mean to you? Does it make you think about how His Light guides you? Maybe it makes you think about the battle of Light against darkness, or perhaps thoughts of Light bring you hope when everything else seems bleak. But have we gotten used to the Light of Jesus Christ shining in our lives? You see, sometimes we take the Light for granted and forget how amazing it is not to walk in darkness. And so, we can take Christmas for granted, too. What a blessing it is that tonight, as sisters, we can pause to bask in the Light and celebrate Jesus Christ – the Light of the world.

As we enter the season for advent, for preparation of our hearts for Christmas, we're going to once again see *what* the Light has rescued us from and *why* we have been taken from the darkness into this glorious Light.

But first, a bit of context. Isaiah prophesied many years before about the Light of Jesus Christ coming into the world. In Isaiah 9:2 we read: *"The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; those who dwelt in a land of deep darkness, on them has light shone."* Fast track some 700 years forward to when the Light became incarnate and we find Jesus referring to Himself as the Light of the world in one of His seven *"I am" statements found in John. There, in chapter 8:12, we hear Jesus saying: "I am the Light of the world. Whoever follows Me will not walk in darkness, but will have the light of life."*

Jesus spoke these words while in the temple during the Feast of Tabernacles (John 7:14), in an area of the temple near the place where the offerings were put (John 8:20). It is said to be a place that had four immense oil candelabras burning continually, and the glow could be seen from parts of Jerusalem—a city on a hill, a city whose light could not be hidden (Matthew 5:14). The Feast of Tabernacles was a feast designed to remind God's people of their desert wandering days, to remind them of when the light from the pillar of fire showed them the way to go in the dark of night (Exodus 13:21). This light represented God's presence, protection and guidance—how He never left those who were His. As Nehemiah (9:19) reflects years later: *"Because of Your great compassion You did not abandon them in the wilderness. By day the pillar of cloud did not fail to guide them on their path, nor the pillar of fire by night to shine on the way they were to take."*

If the people of Israel followed this Light it would lead them home to the promised land. When we follow Jesus Christ, the Light of the world, we will also be led safely Home to ours.

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JESUS CHRIST, LIGHT OF THE WORLD

Why does Jesus call Himself the Light of the world? Let's increase our understanding by looking at other places in Scripture to illuminate this saying of Jesus.

The passage we read earlier from John tells us that The Word – Jesus Christ — was there in the beginning, involved in creating the world along with His Father. Genesis 1:3 reads: "And God said, "let there be light," and there was light." There was only darkness and void before that. 2 Cor 4:6 references this part of the creation story: "For God, Who said, "Let light shine out of darkness," made His light shine in our hearts to give us the light of the knowledge of God's glory displayed in the face of Christ." The connection was there at creation, already before the fall into sin, the framework even then being laid for the Creator of Light to come to earth some 4000 years later. For Him to bring His Light to overpower the darkness of sin, to overpower our sin, and to transform our hearts by giving us knowledge of His Father's glory.

And this gift of Light overpowering darkness was greatly needed. Because although Light was created in the beginning, "people loved darkness rather than the light because their works were evil" (John 3:19). Adam and Eve, and us along with them, fell into sin and darkness returned with the exile from Eden. And so, the plan of God to restore the light and purge the darkness began. This plan is evident on all the pages of the Old Testament Scriptures, and as the New Testament begins, we see the Light become incarnate, come to earth in bodily form. The Light was no longer foreshadowed, but was now with man—Immanuel—shining peace on earth.

But the plan of redemption begun so long ago, the plan to extinguish the darkness of sin, doesn't climax at the stable in Bethlehem. Indeed, the light of Christmas can never be separated from the three hours of darkness when Jesus hung on the cross, darkness that contained all the sins of the past,

present and future. All the darkness of sin was nailed to the cross in those three hours of absolute and total darkness. The reason the Light came into the world was because only Jesus could pay the price for darkness, only He could overcome darkness with His Light and restore peace between God and sinful man. It's something no one else could have done. That's why Christmas can never be separated from Easter, the cradle never separated from the cross, the darkness of the cross never separated from the Light bursting forth from the tomb, radiating to all who followed the Light of Jesus Christ and walked in that Light. The disciples didn't understand all this, even though at the transfiguration (before Jesus goes to the cross) Peter, James and John beheld the Light like never before. We read in Matthew 17:2: "and He was transfigured before them, and His face shone like the sun, and His clothes became white as light."

Do we understand? Do we truly understand all that Jesus has done to dispel the world's darkness, our darkness? Do we believe that the darkness of evil never has and never will overcome or extinguish the Light of the world? Or do we maybe have our questions and doubts when we see the remnants of darkness that remain in our lives and the increasing darkness of the world around us. Is Jesus Christ really the Light of the world? Our Light? But let us find our answers, our confidence, our hope in God's Word and promises: *"The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it"* (John 1:5). Jesus encourages us further, in John 16:33 (NIV): *"In this world you will have trouble. But take heart! I have overcome the world."* Take heart! Darkness has been overcome! That's the promise of Christmas. God with us, God sending His Son Jesus Christ to overcome the darkness of sin with His Light! Jesus Christ, Light of the World, coming to win the battle once and for all of Light over Darkness.

So why do we sometimes feel that we're walking in the dark when we've seen the Light? Why does it seem that the pillar of fire lighting The Way doesn't seem to burn as brightly some days and we even at times seem to lose our way? The answer can perhaps be found when we realise that we live between the "already" and the "not yet". The Light has come but won't

envelop everything completely till its complete fulfillment. And so, although the Light shines in our hearts, vestiges of darkness remain. Not only do we need to contend with the darkness of remaining sin in our hearts, not only do we need to contend with the darkness of Satan and his demons, but we also need to contend with a world that's becoming darker and darker as it rejects any Light of Jesus Christ. We are living in the end times, and we are told to expect the darkness to increase as we near the day of the Light's return. But remember: the Light of Jesus Christ can never be extinguished. He has overcome and won! We are dwelling in His Light and that means dwelling in a place where we may need to fight the darkness, but the darkness will never extinguish our light. It cannot and will not, if we remain in Christ, sharing in His Light, walking in His Light. And that means we have hope. Hope for the now. Hope for the future.

Light means purity and perfect holiness (1 John 1:5). Light means truth, exposing evil. Jesus is perfectly pure and perfectly holy. Jesus is truth and so burned away the impurity of sin, of darkness, for us. Just as darkness cannot stand before light so sin cannot stand before God. Only the Light of Jesus Christ could dispel the darkness of sin. If we have the Light of Jesus, it's impossible to walk in spiritual darkness. Just as Jesus was born to bring Light to those walking in darkness, so our rebirth with Him brings Light to the darkness of sin in our hearts. In turn, we can reflect His light to those around us, and that's what we'll look at next.

JESUS CHRIST'S LIGHT REFLECTORS

In the Light of Jesus Christ we see ourselves as we are: sinners, in need of a Saviour. But in His light we also see who we are becoming through the Light of His Spirit: Light Reflectors! Because in His Light we see the Way, and so we can follow in His footsteps. Not only do we walk in Christ's Light, but He has also chosen to reflect His very Light through us, His children of Light (Eph 5:8). Even though our vessels may be cracked (2 Cor 4:7), that doesn't stop the Light of Christ from radiating to those around us.

The Jews were meant to shine God's Light to the Gentiles (Isaiah 49:6), except they stumbled over the Cornerstone themselves (Mark 12:10) and so failed in their mission. In fact, it is because of their very failure, even in spite of it, that the gospel went to the Gentiles (Romans 11:11). And we can be so thankful for that. Because we *are* the Gentiles, we *are* those grafted branches that Paul speaks about. We walk in the Light because of grace, because of mercy. Let's never forget that as this knowledge helps to keep us humble as we reach out to others walking in darkness, realising we were also rescued from it, even though we deserved not to be.

John 12:36 reads: "Believe in the Light so that you may become children of Light" walking as children of Light (Eph 5:8), growing toward the Light, reflecting it more and more as we shine as lights and declare the Light in this dark world, holding firmly to the word of life (Phil 2:15), not stumbling over the Cornerstone, not rejecting the Cornerstone, but being illuminated by Him, trusting in Him, building on Him, receiving Light from the Father of lights through Him (James 1:17).

And so, equipped with oil in our lamps to light our way, we are called to share His Light to those still walking in darkness. Individually, but also communally as church of Southern River. Our church is to be a spiritual house where we are living spiritual stones in its wall. May our church be a beacon to the lost, a place where Jesus' Light beckons others to join us, a city on a hill, beaming the love of God into our neighbourhood. And isn't it wonderful that — by the grace of God – we could witness so much Light in our church building this past Sunday? What a sign of the power of God's light transformation we could behold in the profession of faiths and baptisms. No, our church is not perfect. But that doesn't stop God from using us to shine His Light, dispelling the darkness. That's the power of Jesus Christ — Light of the world!

But sometimes we hide our light (Matthew 5). We do this by being quiet when we should speak, by going along with the crowd and blending into the darkness of the world, by bypassing opportunities the Light places on our paths. Or we let the busyness of our lives distract us from filling our lamps from the illuminating Light of The Word and so our light grows dim and we're not able to light our own path, much less showing light to another's path. Do you feel guilty when you consider the level of oil in your lamps? Because guilt does nothing, changes nothing. Asking Jesus Christ to fill our lamps, fill our hearts with His transformative Light will do something! Fill your lamps from the oil His Word and Spirit provide. Ask, and He will fill you, making you His Light reflector, so you can shine brightly for Him and lead others to Him!

Why do we need to reflect the Light of Jesus Christ? Peter tells us: we're a "a chosen people, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, God's special possession" (1 Peter 2:9 NIV). That's who we are and to Whom we belong! And who we are and to Whom we belong determines what we do and how we live. Peter continues by explaining what we are to do: "That you may proclaim the excellencies of Him who called you out of darkness into His marvelous light." Jesus came to glorify His Father by proclaiming Who His Father was. May we, as we wait for our entrance into the eternal Kingdom of Light, be busy doing the same. Let's let our "light so shine before men, that they may see your good works and glorify your Father in heaven" (Matthew 5:16 NKJV).

Proclaiming to the darkness who the Light of the world is can have mixed results. Some wonderful results, as we've been privileged to witness in our church, but also some sad results. John 3:19,20 warns us: "And this is the judgment: the light has come into the world, and people loved the darkness rather than the light because their works were evil. For everyone who does wicked things hates the light and does not come to the light, lest his works should be exposed." But our job as light bearers is not to give our light to others. We can't do that. We couldn't give Light to ourselves either. If it weren't for God's mercy and grace, we would still be in darkness. But we can hold out the light to others and show them what it's like to walk in the light. Christmas provides ample opportunity to do just that.

One day, darkness will be dispelled forever and there will only be Beautiful Light everywhere. As we wait for that Great Day, we see signs of increasing darkness around us. But let that not frighten or surprise us, because we know that this means the Day of the Light's return is closer (1 Thess 5:4). Instead, may it urge us to ensure we have oil in our lamps (Matthew 25:4), and so burn brightly for Jesus Christ in the midst of the present darkness.

The Light of Jesus Christ did not stop at coming to Bethlehem as a baby with a star lighting the way. The Light of Jesus Christ did not leave us when He ascended to Heaven (Matthew 28:20), but today radiates in us and through us until the Light will return on the clouds of heaven. And then we'll dwell eternally in that Light, as we'll reflect more on after our next hymn.

It will be a place where we shall be like Him (1 John 3:2), dwelling in His Light for all eternity.

Looking forward to this Day of Beautiful Light gives us hope—hope for the eternity of Light set before us, already shining now. Do you see it?

CONCLUSION


